Groundwater's Role in Michigan's Economic Vitality

- Few states can accurately or confidentially determine how many residential wells are in place. For each region, the American Housing Survey by the U.S. Census provides regional data. Michigan is found in the Midwest, along with these other states: Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, and Missouri. The last American Housing Survey Census indicates this region had 3,990,000² households served by residential wells, with an average of 2.52³ persons per household. The U.S. Census stopped asking citizens their source of water supply following the 1990 Census. The USGS estimates the population of self-supplied water supply users in Michigan to be 2,680,000⁴.
- 1,080 community water systems use groundwater for 1,680,000 people⁵
- 1,310 non-community, non-transient water systems use groundwater for 303,000 people⁶
- 8,230 non-community, transient water systems use groundwater for 1,010,000 people⁷
- 7,550 irrigation wells used serving 2,820 farms and 467,000 acres⁸

Michigan's Groundwater Industry Employment

Men and women working to provide and protect Michigan's groundwater resources for the benefit of people, business, and our environment.

Michigan's Contracting Employment

Drill and service water wells, install and service pumps, install and service point of use water treatment devices. This portion of the industry is characterized by small firms, many of which are multi-generation family-owned and operated.⁹

- 331 firms employ an estimated 1,420 people¹⁰
- Annual estimated sales of \$375 million

Michigan's Scientists and Engineers Employment

Geologists, hydrogeologists, engineers, geochemists, geophysicists, microbiologists, regulators.

Environmental Consulting¹¹

NAICS 54162: Establishments primarily engaged in providing advice and assistance on environmental issues, such as the control of environmental contamination from pollutants, toxic substances, and hazardous materials.

- 527 firms employ an estimated 1,870 people
- Annual estimated sales of \$276 million

Remediation¹²

NAICS 56291: Establishments include those engaged in remediation and cleanup of contaminated buildings, mine sites, soil, or groundwater.

- 173 firms employ an estimated 2,190 people
- Annual estimated sales of \$353 million
